According to legend, a safe house along the Underground Railroad was often indicated by a quilt hanging from a clothesline or windowsill. These quilts were embedded with a kind of code, so that by reading the shapes and motifs sewn into the design, an enslaved person on the run could know the area's immediate dangers or even where to head next. Bow Tie = Dress in disguise to appear of a higher status.

Underground Railroad Signal Quilt During the 1800's the Log Cabin quilt pattern always used red as the center square to represent the heart or hearth of the home. During the Civil War they would color this block black and hang the quilt on the clothesline to signal runaway slaves that "This is a safe house."

Some people believe that certain classic quilt blocks were used to send messages to slaves escaping to freedom on the Underground Railroad. The quilts were hung outside of homes along the Underground Railroad to let the slaves know what was safe or unsafe, and to communicate further instructions or directions.

I'll cite only three.

Amongst the patterns which are said to have held meaning for enslaved persons on the Underground Railroad was the monkey wrench pattern, which supposedly advised slaves to begin to pack the things they would need for their journey. Other patterns that have been included in the quilt code are the wagon wheel, drunkard's path, and tumbling blocks.

Fact or Fiction: Were Quilts Used As Secret Codes for ...

This quilt is one that is part of the Underground Railroad Quilt Code. The pattern is made of half-square triangles and squares. Hidden in plain view on clotheslines and fences, this quilt identifies a friendly guide who is willing to help escaped slaves. The Amish block is names for a wild plant called the shoo-fly and/or clover broom.

This particular quilt square sends the message for the slaves to pack their wagon, or to prepare to leave on a wagon to begin their trip on the Underground Railroad to freedom. The first “stops” along the Underground Railroad were found in the South. Truth: The Underground Railroad did not exist as an organization in the south. Slaves rarely received any help until they reached a free, Northern State. They had to reach freedom on their own, which they usually did by foot. Myth: Many slaves escaped from the Deep South.
